Approval of prior meeting minutes: Motion to approve prior meeting minutes with changes made was made by Clydene Dechert, seconded by Alison Alva and passed unanimously.

New Business:

- **Financial Report:** The financial report did not include the payroll of \$63,592.00. A small amount of ESSER funds are available. There will be an incoming bill of about \$8,000 for the fire alarm system for the new building. State funds are a bit higher than last year due to increased enrollment. Fence and tree money has been reimbursed by the auto insurance of the person who hit them. Motion to approve the financial report was made by Melanie Arcuri, seconded by Clydene Dechert and passed unanimously.
- **New Playground rules:** Fine tuning of the playground rules, added rules to keep students safe. These new rules include rules about food due to free breakfast, so no food on the playground (during breakfast food must be eaten in classroom/cafeteria) to keep students safe, and grounds clean. Lane Burkitt thinks having too many detailed rules will lead to the children finding loopholes in following said rules. He also thinks more general rules will be better for both aides and kids to remember, Melanie Arcuri thinks that the more detailed the rules the better. These would be rules for staff at the beginning of the year training to keep staff on the same page as playground rules go. Need to add the rules about food in next year's staff handbook. Motion to revisit other non food rules and possibly make them more positive in nature at a later meeting, motion made by Lane Burkitt, seconded by Tom Franklin and passed unanimously.
- **Volunteer / Visitor Policy:** The current policy at P.V. school is that all volunteers must have a level 1 fingerprint clearance card. The revised state statute states that parent volunteers do not need an IVP clearance card. Cindy is not sure when the school policy changed. She believes that only the volunteers that will work one on one with students should have an IVP clearance card. She also wants to ensure that we have a policy that aligns with the revised state statute. Possibly a background check to ensure the volunteers do not have a criminal record. Possibly have different levels of volunteering with different criteria for each level. Have a list of volunteers to then check against the state public sex offender list. Cindy would like to discuss with Leo Condos to examine the older policy with the new policy. A motion to table this for the next meeting to do more research was made by Melanie Arcuri, seconded by Tom Franklin and passed unanimously.

Old Business:

- **Prescott Valley Campus Update:** We are fully staffed teacher and para-educator wise. We are looking for one more janitor.
- **Big 5 Building Update:** The walls are framed. Inspections are being completed by the Town of Prescott Valley. This new building should be ready before Christmas.

Playground Rules:

1. Listen to instruction and correction from adults in charge.
2. Play safely.

Don't do things like thumping the teeter totter on the ground, jumping off the swings or bleachers or throwing rocks.

3. Be respectful of the feelings of others.

Play games that allow full participation like Horse or shooting baskets rather than excluding some by forming teams and refusing to allow everyone to play.

4. Don't jump off, over or through anything more than knee high.

Jumping or falling is one of the most common playground injuries and can be serious

5. You may not leave the playground without permission from a teacher or aide.

(If students are to leave the playground they must have a pass, even to retrieve a ball.)

6. If you wonder if it is safe, don't do it.
7. Don't encourage others to do things that will harm them or others.
8. Remember, metal bars are slippery. Be extra careful in the winter when you are wearing gloves.
9. Pretend, play, have fun, make up games be creative.
10. If the adults in charge think you are doing something unsafe or inappropriate, they will require you to stop (see rule 1).

Volunteer Policies

Parents are the most important partner in their child's education. For this reason the staff at Franklin School promises to let parents know what is happening in the child's education through daily homework sheets, phone calls and emails as well as weekly objectives. Parents may also visit their child's classroom to observe activities by signing into the office as long as such visits are made on an irregular basis. If a parent desires to visit a classroom frequently they will be required to become a part of our volunteer program.

All Parents are always encouraged to attend school wide functions such as parent teacher conferences, curriculum nights and school performances and exhibitions unless specific legal prohibition is in force.

Volunteers are welcomed at our school. Children thrive best when they know that parents are supportive of their education. Volunteers do not need to be parents . However any individual who frequently visits our campus will need to have a volunteer background check performed so that school safety may be maintained.

In order to make this process as easy as possible for families as well as ensure student safety, parent or immediate family volunteers will be classified into three levels of school and classroom access. Level 1 volunteers are people who have not obtained a fingerprint clearance card or background check. They can attend all school wide functions as well as work on classroom projects for teachers in a special volunteer area of the campus.

Level two volunteers include both parents and community members. After a brief background check they will be given increased access to the classroom. They can assist with classroom parties or supervise events as long as they constantly remain in areas where they can be visually observed by a fingerprinted employee. A level 1 or a level 2 volunteer is not able to be in situations where they would supervise a student or a group of students without being directly monitored by a fingerprinted employee. For example level two volunteers would not be able to lead groups of children on a field trip, supervise bathroom breaks or place themselves in types of situations where they would be alone with children without staff supervision.

Level three volunteers are parents or individuals who have obtained and provided the school office with an active background verified fingerprint clearance card (IVP card). While these individuals would still follow the direction of school employees, they would be able to supervise groups of children in situations where direct observation by a school staff member is not always possible. We encourage all parents to sign up and obtain the level of volunteer access that best meets their needs .

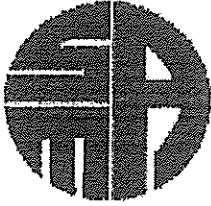

Report on Compliance for Each Federal Program

We have audited Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc.'s compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the OMB Compliance Supplement that could have a direct and material effect on each of Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc.'s major federal programs for the year ended, June 30, 2021. Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc.'s major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditors' results section of the accompanying schedule of finding and questioned costs.

Management's Responsibility

Management is responsible for compliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of its federal programs.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance for each of Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc.'s major federal programs based on our audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issues by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of *Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance). Those standards and the Uniform Guidance require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc.' compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

Opinion on Each Major Federal Program

In our opinion, Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc. complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2021.

Report on Internal Control Over Compliance

Management of Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc. is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above. In planning and performing our audit of compliance, we considered Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc.'s internal control over compliance with the types of requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each major federal program to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance for each major federal program and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Franklin Phonetic Primary School, Inc.'s internal control over compliance.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.
